rayer wheels or Mani wheels are spiritual devices used by Buddhists to spread blessings and well-being of mankind. Rolls of paper imprinted with the mantra - Om Mani Padme Hum (hail to the jewel in the lotus) in thousands are placed in a cylindrical container usually made of brass or bronze. The same mantra in large and more decorative syllables is carved outside the wheel as well.

There are many types of prayer wheels although hand-held are most common. The large prayer wheels are placed on the gates of the monasteries or around stupus and chortens. These are also placed where they can be spun by wind or running water. As the prayer wheel rotates (always clockwise) on its axis, it distributes blessings and good karma to all those who see it or hear the bell that chimes on every turn. The greater the number of turns and printed mantrus inside, the more positive are their effects - they help to win merit and obtain a good reincarnation.

Some believe that the six syllables of the mantra - Om Mani Padme Hum nullify the six negative emotions - pride, greed, jealousy, anger, lust and ignorance.

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
